1) **(Holy Land)** *Ortelius, Abraham, Turcici Imperii Descripto.* Amsterdam: c. 1590. 50x39 cm. Original color. Laid down on a board. Light wear along centerfold. Shows from Italy to the Persian Gulf. \$575.00

2) **(Germany)** *Blaeu, Guillelmus, Rugia Insula ac Ducatus Accuratissime Descripta.* Amsterdam: 1631. 38x49 cm. Attractive map of this German island in the Baltic Sea just off the coast of Mecklenburg. Contemporary color, with uncolored coats of arms at the sides. Very light stain at bottom of center fold. \$425.00

3) **(Sweden/Norway)** *Mercator/Hondius, Tabula Exactissima Regnorum Sueciae et Norvegiae, Nec Non Maris Universi Orientalis ...* Amsterdam: c. 1633. 44x55.2 cm. A scarce map from the 1633 Mercator/Hondius/Jansson atlas. Bright original color, partially outline, highlights fully colored. German text on back. This map was not included in all editions of the atlas. Shows all of northern Europe, including modern Sweden, Norway and Finland from the northern tip of Holland to western Russia, showing Moscow at extreme east. \$1,250.00



4) **(World)** *Merian, Nova Totius Terrarum Orbis Geographica ac Hydrographica Tabula.* Frankfurt: c. 1638. 25x36 cm. Uncolored map of the world with polar projections at the bottom corners. Engraver's signature is not present. This is a beautifully engraved world map on Mercator's projection. The cartography was closely copied from Blaeu's world map of 1606. Latin title at top, outside neatline, with German gothic script title and a notation concerning the discovery of the Americas in 1492 that covers the unknown interior of North America. There is a large southern continent connected to New Guinea, California is a peninsula, and there are many open-ended waterways in the eastern part of North America. \$1,750.00

5) **(Scotland)** *Blaeu, W. & J., Fiffae Pars Orientalis, The East Part of Fife.* Amsterdam: c.1650. 41x52 cm. Framed. Part-outline, part-full color. Light foxing and age-toning. An early map of this Scottish county on the Firth of Forth. Shows the city of Dundee on the northern shore of the Tay River in the north. \$650.00

6) **(Scotland)** *Blaeu, W. & J., Scotiae Provinciae Mediterraneae inter Taum Flumen et Cararis Aestuarium: Sunt autem Braid-Allaban, Atholia, Marria Superior, Badenoch, Strath-Spea..* Amsterdam: c.1650. 41x51 cm. Framed. Outline color. Light staining at top left, otherwise fine. Shows much of the lower part of northwestern Scotland, including Inverness, Loch Ness, Loch Tay, etc. Text on verso in French. \$650.00

7) **(South America)** *Ogilby, John?, Tabula Magellanica Qua Terrae del Fuego, Cum Celeberrimis Fretis a F. Magellano et I. Le Maire Detectis.* [London?]: 1671. 29.6x35.6 cm. Uncolored map of Tierra del Fuego, with many fanciful cartouches of ostriches, penguins and animals scattered throughout the map. Wide margins. Light water stain in margins at left and right, minor chipping at bottom edge. A fine dark image. There is an illustration of a sea battle involving roughly a dozen ships at the ocean at the bottom left. This view appeared in John Ogilby's seminal work, *America: Being the Latest, and Most Accurate Description of the New World*, published in London in 1671. Ogilby's work is an English translation of Arnoldus Montanus' *Die Nieuwe en onbekende Weereld...*, published in Amsterdam, although greatly expanded in some instances and with new maps and views. \$775.00

8) **(Carolinas)** *Speed, John, A New Description of Carolina.* London: 1676. 37x51 cm. Map, Early color, very good condition, light browning in margins, slightly heavier at the top, small wormholes in the wide bottom margin, not close to the border. From Speed's *Prospect of the Most Famous Parts of the World*. A classic early map of the Southeastern United States. Very attractive. Oriented with north at the right side of the map. Engraved, as other maps in this book, by Francis Lamb. Based on the Ogilby/Moxon map of the region from 1672, reflecting the latest information on settlements there. Shows the southeast coast from St. Augustine to Cape Henry, centering on the Carolinas and the Hatteras Banks. Cumming (Southeast) 77. \$5,250.00



9) **(Western Hemisphere)** *Speed, John, America with Those Known Parts in That Unknown World Both People and Manner of Buildings Discribed.* London: 1676. 39x51.5 cm. Map in excellent condition with light wear and toning to top and right edges. Original color, part outline, part full. A notable map for its fully colored depictions of natives of America along the left and right sides and the small plans of cities and towns along the top. English text on verso from publication in *A Prospect of the Most Famous Parts of the World*. First published in 1626 (the date on the map face), this is the fourth state, sold by Bassett and Chiswell. The first edition was the first map published in an atlas to show California as an island. Engraved by Abraham Goos. Burden 217, McLaughlin & Mayo 3, Tooley pp. 302-3, Wheat 39. \$9,500.00

10) **(Florida)** *Du Val, Pierre, Florida.* Nurnburg: 1679. 9.5x12 cm. Tiny map on stiff paper from Du Val's *Geographiae Universalis Pars Prior*. Some outline color. Good condition, with light smudging in top margin. Right margin very thin. Cumming 86 : "This map is like Du Val's Floride ca. 1559, except for the Latinization of names." The title of the map says Florida, but this map is actually of the entire Southeast, from the mouth of the Rio Grande to Lake Erie. \$400.00



11) (Western Hemisphere) *Zahn, Johannes, Facies Una Hemisphaerii Terrestris*. Nuremberg: 1696. 36x84 cm. Hemispheric map of North and South America with much of the Pacific. Full early color with very decorative elements (cherubs, depictions of zodiac symbols, etc.) at the corners, set against dark backgrounds. One small tear, repaired, near bottom of center fold. Shows California as an island with a nearly straight east-west coastline in the north. Published, with a companion map of the eastern hemisphere, in *Mundus Mirabili*, Nuremberg: 1696. McLaughlin 122, Shirley 584 (plate 403). \$2,750.00

12) (Norway/Sweden) *De Witt, Frederick, Regni Norvegia Nova Tabula in Quinque Praefecturas Generalis Aggerhusiensem, Bergensem, Nidrosiensem, Warhusiae et Bahusiae*. Amsterdam: c. 1700. 60x51 cm. Scarce map of Sweden and Norway. Full original color. Fair to good condition. Trimmed close at edges with damage at bottom corners extending into the borders. There is a chip in the border at the bottom right which goes just to the neat line of the map surface. Light stain at top right corner. Fully colored cartouche at bottom left, inset map of northern Norway at top left. Later reprinted from the same plate by Mortier. \$750.00

13) (Americas) *Van Der Aa, Pierre, L'Amerique Septentrionale, Suivant les Nouvelles Observations ... With: L'Amerique Meridionale Suivant ...* Leiden: c. 1705. 42x30 cm. Maps of North America and South America from *Cartes des Itinéraires et Voyages Modernes*, joined to make one map. The bottom border of the North America map and north border of the South America map were removed long ago to allow the merger of these maps. Margins intact but extremely thin. Full color by region. Light glue stains near center join. Very attractive, with colored cartouches for each of the original maps. California is not an island. \$650.00

14) (South America) *Moll, Herman, Map of Terra Firma, Peru, Amazoneland, Brasil & the North P. of La Plata*. London: 1719. 21x38 cm. Small uncolored map of the northern portion of South America. Very good condition, creased along one fold, trimmed tight at bottom right margin. Removed from a volume. Many place names. The central part of Brazil bears the legend "Little Known." \$250.00

15) (North America) *Moll, Herman, A New Map of the North Parts of America Claimed by France Under Ye Names of Louisiana, Mississippi, Canada and New France* London: 1720. 45x90 cm. A fair copy of a most attractive map. This copy is repaired and rebacked, with some loss at folds and at borders. The lost is most

significant at the top and bottom of the center fold where there is loss of text. Outline color. Shows North America from Newfoundland to lower California, with California's northern geography left ambiguous. Inset maps of Annapolis and the Mouth of the Mississippi River. There is also a view of the Indian Fort Sasquesahanok at the top left. Outline color. Published by Moll in 1720 along with the Sommers and "Beaver" maps of North America. \$2,750.00

16) (North America) *Moll, Herman, To the Right Honourable John Lord Summers ... This Map of North America According to Ye Newest and Most Exact Observations Is Most Humbly Dedicated....* London: 1720. 58x97 cm. A fair copy only of this large, attractive map of North America, repaired, with some loss along the leftmost of 3 folds. Modern rebacking. 10 inset maps, fine cartouches. Outline color. The loss affects a small portion of the cartouche but is otherwise confined to areas in the Pacific Ocean. This is a very famous, decorative map with 10 inset maps of ports and a large view of a Newfoundland fishery. This is the noted "Codfish" map which serves often serves as a companion piece to the "Beaver" map which appeared in the same atlas by Moll. 17) (Atlantic Ocean) [*Cutler, Nathaniel*], *A New and Correct Chart of the Atlantick Ocean Reduced Describing Part of the Coasts of Europe, Africa and America with Their Adjacent Islands*. [London]: c. 1728. 58x50 cm. Uncolored sea chart showing both sides of the Atlantic, with towns and bays featured on each coast. Separately published, and larger than most other contemporary charts of the Atlantic. A compass rose is located in the Caribbean, just east of Puerto Rico, with directional lines radiating out providing a most interesting look to this chart. \$750.00

18) (Canada) *Covens & Mortier, Carte du Canada Ou de la Nouvelle France de des Decouvertes Quiy Ont Ete Faites*. Amsterdam: c. 1730. 49x57 cm. An early reissue of De L'Isle's landmark map of Canada from 1703. Original outline color. Very good condition, slight offsetting. A fine copy of one of the most important 18th century maps of Canada, showing most of Greenland and Baffin Bay. \$1,350.00



19) (North America) *Covens and Mortier, Carte Particuliere de l'Amerique Septentrionale*. Amsterdam: c. 1740. 49x48 cm. The key map from the Covens and Mortier edition of the Popple map. Colored red through the British possession in what would become the United States and southern Canada. Trimmed close at bottom, otherwise wide margins. Generally good, but with a repair along the centerfold in

Pennsylvania and discoloration along the southeastern coast and the western border of Pennsylvania. Views of New York, Quebec, Niagara Falls and Mexico City at the top corners, harbors and islands along the right side. \$3,000.00

20) **(Celestial)** *Doppelmayr, J. G., Phaenomena in Planetis Primariis.* Nuremberg: c. 1750. 51x56 cm. Planetary chart in two sections, one above the other. Full original color. Fine condition. The charts indicate the locations of the planets at different phases of their orbits. \$825.00



21) **(North America)** *Buache, Phil. & De l'Isle, Joseph, Carte des Nouvelles Decouvertes au Nord de la Mer du Sud, Tant a l'Est de la Sibirie et du Kamtchatka ...* Paris: 1752. 45.5x64 cm. Map, First edition. Original outline color. Excellent condition, with very minor damage in bottom margin at centerfold. This is the first map to show the apochryphal "Mar ou Baye de l'Ouest", a huge body of water east of the current location of San Francisco. Wagner (Cartography of the Northwest Coast of America) at p. 158 has an extensive article on the origins and mapping of this inland sea. Tooley (America) p. 34, no. 101, Schwartz & Ehrenberg p. 157. plate 94. \$3,500.00

22) **(Europe)** *Kitchin, Thomas, A Correct Map of Europe Divided into its Empires Eingdoms & Drawn from the Most Approved Maps and Charts ...* London: 1755. 67x77 cm. Map from Postlethwait's Dictionary. Hand-colored in outline by country and region. Some offsetting, discoloration along center fold. Inset map of Spitsbergen (here called Greenland) at top right \$375.00

23) **(Florida)** *Gentleman's Magazine, A Map of the New Governments, of East & West Florida.* London: 1763. 20x25 cm. Uncolored map from the *Gentleman's Magazine*. Very good condition. Inset Plan of the Harbour and Settlement of Pensacola. Jolly (Brit Per) GENT-171; Cumming, (Southeast) 336. \$550.00

24) **(Atlantic Ocean)** *Bowen, Abel, A New & Accurate Map of the Western or Atlantic Ocean Drawn from Surveys and Most Approved Maps & Charts.* London: c. 1764. 37x45 cm. Map, Outline color, excellent condition. Very attractive copy. Taken from Harris's *Navigantium atque ...* Shows the entire Atlantic Ocean north of the equator including the coasts of Europe, Africa, North America and South America. \$425.00

25) **(World)** *Brion de la Tour, Hemisphere Occidental, with: Hemisphere Oriental.* Paris: c. 1766. 36x39 cm. A handsome pair of maps, showing the eastern and western hemispheres, delicately hand-colored with uncolored baroque borders. Light waterstains in top margin of Western Hemisphere map, in right margin of Eastern. Very light scattered foxing. \$650.00

26) **(Philadelphia)** *Leizelt, Bath Frederic, Vue de Philadelphie.* Augsburg: c. 1776. 33x44 cm. Vue d'optique of Philadelphia. Thin margins, light wear, bottom right corner has a tear, with the loss of a 4.5x2 cm segment including a few letters of the text. Hand-colored fanciful view of the riverfront.. There are large, classical design buildings on the right, directly on the river. 3 ships are shown on the water along with men in several row boats. Around the time of the American Revolution, Habermann and Leizelt created a series of engravings purportedly of Philadelphia, Boston, and a few other important American cities as perspective views. These views were vividly colored. They were drawn to be viewed with a zogroscope, an optical device that used a mirror and magnifying lens. The combination of perspective, color and viewing through the mechanism attempted to create a three-dimensional image. The Habermann and Leizelt views of American cities were largely fictitious. Snyder states that this view, rather than being of Philadelphia, might have been the Seamen's Hospital in Greenwich, England. 27) **(Revolutionary War)** *Universal Magazine, A New and Accurate Map of the Present Seat of War in North America, Comprehending New Jersey, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, New York, &c..* London: 1777. 36x29 cm. Map from the June, 1777 issue of *Universal Magazine*, bound in later plain wrappers with the 56 pp. text of that issue. Map is in good condition, with two short tears from the margins and small separations at two fold junctions. Uncolored. An attractive map of the primary theater of action in the war, the region from Philadelphia to the New York City area, including an identification of American Winter Quarters above White Plains.. 28) **(United States)** *Lotter, Matthieu Albert, Carte Nouvelle de L'Amerique Angloise Contenant Tout ce que les Anglois Possedent sur le Continent de l'Amerique Septentrionale ...* Augsburg: 1777. 48.5x59 cm. A fine copy of this very attractive Revolutionary War-era map of the colonies. No date on map, but datable through references. Shows Canada, Florida, and Fort Duquesne. Each of the colonies is shown in full color, but their shapes are, to put it mildly, approximations. The coloring has been heightened with gilt. \$2,250.00



29) **(Long Island)** *Des Barres, J.F.W., [Hell Gate, Oyster Bay and Huntington].* London: 1778. 84x56 cm. Map from Des Barres's classic *Atlantic Neptune*. Hand colored. Very good condition, remargined at bottom, with lower neatlines reinstated in facsimile and

small repair in upper left corner, not affecting image. This is actually two maps on one sheet. The top map shows the area from Roosevelt Island and Manhattan to Flushing Bay and College Point, showing the south shore of the Bronx. The primary map extends from Oyster Bay, Oak Neck, and Hog Island on the north shore of Long Island to Eaton Neck, Huntington Bay and Cow Harbor. Shows soundings, anchorages, and topographical detail. Des Barres's atlas was one of the great cartographic achievements of the 18th century, representing, according to Cohen & Augustyn, "an unprecedented leap toward greater precision and graphic sophistication." This map represents the first truly accurate charting of this area on the north shore of Long Island. \$8,250.00

30) (England) *Cary, John, Cary's New Map of England and Wales, with Part of Scotland. On Which Are Carefully Laid Down, All the Direct and Principal Cross Roads, the Course of the Rivers and Navigable Canals; Cities, Market and Borough Towns, Parishes, and Most Considerable Hamlets, Parks, Forest &c. &c.* London: 1794. 219x196 cm. Case map, dissected and linen-backed, in original leather slipcase with marbled boards, somewhat scuffed. First edition of this very large, colorful 6-part map of England and Wales. Maps have labels of William Faden. Full color by county. A very attractive map. Though also issued in book form, this edition was obviously put together at the time at Faden's shop as Faden's label appears on each of the six sections. \$1,250.00

31) (Sweden/Norway) *Faden, William, Scandia or Scandinavia Comprehending Sweden, and Norway with the Danish Islands.* London: 1794. 71x49 cm. Trimmed close with small chips at right side and bottom left corner, otherwise very good condition. Original outline color. Uncolored cartouche at top left. First edition of a map later republished by Wyld around 1820. The copy in the Rumsey Collection has full color. A crisp, clean map of Scandinavia and the Baltic States. Excellent detail showing hills and small towns. \$750.00

32) (New York State) , *Herkimer County Town plans.* n.p.: c.1795. 21.8x16.7 cm. A lovely small manuscript map in a contemporary frame and glass. Shows four proposed towns (Warren, Litchfield, German Flatts and Frankford) in upstate New York Herkimer County which were to be divided out from an area called German Flats along the Mohawk River near Canada Creek. \$400.00



33) (United States) *Laurie & Whittle, The United States of America with the British Possessions of Canada, Nova Scotia,*

New Brunswick and Newfoundland Divided with the French, also the Spanish Territories of Louisiana and Florida According to the Preliminary Articles of Peace Signed at Versailles the 20th of Jan^y 1783.. London: 1794. 45x51 cm. Original full color by country. Very good condition, with some adhesive discoloration in the top and bottom margins, not affecting printed surface. There is a short split at the bottom of the center fold. Very attractive, with an American flag at the top of the cartouche at the bottom right. Text from Article 3 of the Treaty of Paris related to fishing rights is printed to the left of the cartouche. Dated in print May 12 1794. Does not identify the State of Franklin. 34) (North Carolina) *Denison, J., Map of North and South Carolina.* Philadelphia: 1795. 18.2x21 cm. Uncolored map from Jedediah Morse's *Universal Geography*, engraved by Amos Doolittle. Counties in North Carolina named but not outlined. \$225.00

35) (New York State) *DeWitt, Simeon, Map of the State of New York ... Contracted from his Large Map of the State.* [New York]: 1804. 57x70 cm. Case map, dissected and backed on original linen, with original slipcase, sides split, repaired near top. Outline color by county. Very good condition, with light age-toning. The western section of the state is virtually undeveloped, with Buffalo and Rochester not yet founded. Genesee County covers the entire western extremity of the state and has only 3 towns identified. Streeter 893: "This is apparently one of the earliest separate folding maps of New York after it became a state." Very scarce. This was a reduced version of DeWitt's exceedingly rare large 6-part map of the state. DeWitt's maps were the best maps of the state before the building of the Erie Canal. Not in Phillips. \$4,500.00

36) (Egypt) *Arrowsmith, Aaron, Map of Upper Egypt, Drawn from Various Documents.* London: 1816. 99x66.5 cm. Folding map, dissected and backed by linen, crudely repaired in some places, split and detached along several folds with no loss of map surface. Shows northern Egypt and the Upper Nile above Assouan (Aswan), with an inset map of a stretch below that. Cairo and Suez are at the northern edge of the map. The western portion of the Sinai is shown. Uncolored. Very good detail along the river, with very little shown in the outlying desert areas. Text on the map describes the canals and roads of the area. \$650.00

37) (New Hampshire) *Carrigain, Philip, New Hampshire by Recent Survey Made Under Supreme Authority and Published.* [Concord]: 1818. 159x126 cm. Wall map, restored, with original roads and modern linen backing. Varnish removed. There are some manuscript notations on the map face. This is the rare second edition of the first official map of New Hampshire. Large insets of New England/Maritime Provinces, and the Southern/Central United States. Cobb does not list an 1818 edition of this map and Rumsey refers to the 1816 edition as the "first, and only" edition. Mevers and Stark, "The Making of the Carrigain Map of New Hampshire," in *Historical New Hampshire*, vol. 52 nos. 3&4 (Fall/Winter 1997) alludes to a second edition from which Carrigain sold copies privately, but cited no known copies. A very attractive copy of the rare second edition of one of the great state maps of the early 19th century. Ristow p.96, Streeter 729. \$8,500.00

38) (United States) *Melish, John, United States of America, Compiled from the Latest & Best Authorities.* Philadelphia: 1818. 40.2x49 cm. Fully colored map from the Rees *Encyclopedia*. Wear and small splits along some previous folds. Extends to the Rocky Mountains and just beyond, with a large, partially delineated Texas. Outline color by state. Published by Murray, Draper, Fairman & Co. and engraved by Samuel Harrison. This is the first issue of Melish's famous map, without Castle Rock and James Peak which were added after the Long Expedition of 1819-20, but is not to be confused with

Melish's larger landmark 1816 map of the United States. Wheat (Transmississippi) 327. \$1,250.00



39) **(United States) Lewis, Samuel, Travellers Guide to the United States.** Philadelphia: 1819. 84x100 cm. Wall map, Rebacked and restored with modern linen, varnish removed, original rods. A very attractive copy of this scarce early map of the United States by one of the premier early American cartographers. Important early map of the United States, being one of the earliest large format separately issued maps to include details of the Lewis & Clark Expedition up the Missouri River. This is an exceptional example of an elegantly engraved and attractively colored work. The map has a number of unusual features, reflective of the geo-political changes occurring in the rapidly expanding United States of the second decade of the 19th century. It is one of just a few maps to show Alabama as a territory, which existed for only three years, 1817-19. The then-recently admitted states of Indiana (1816), Mississippi (1817), and Illinois (1818) are all shown as states on the map. "North Western Territory," is shown in the area of present-day Wisconsin. The original Northwest Territory ceased to exist in 1803, and we could find no record of an official U. S. territory labeled as above. Texas is an amorphous area bounded in the north by the Red River but with no clear territorial identity. Information from the explorations of Lewis and Clark is incorporated in the upper Missouri River area. The northern boundary with Canada is strange: it follows the 47.5 parallel and the Upper Missouri River, with a curious note about the lands of his "Catholic Majesty." The map provides quite extensive coverage of the road system of the United States, qualifying the work as a "Travellers Guide," as it is identified in its title. Described by Ralph Brown in Ristow as "perhaps the most enterprising commercial map-maker of the period," Samuel Lewis (c. 1754-1822) had a hand in many if not most publications dating from the infancy of American map production. In addition to large scale maps like the ones referred to above, Lewis supplied maps for the first American-published atlas, M. Carey's of 1795, the small-format version of the same appearing a year later, and subsequent editions of both. Lewis also contributed maps to the publications of several other, early American map publishers, including Fielding Lucas. A very nice clean example, much better than most which appear on the market (see e.g. the Rumsey example for a typical example) \$9,500.00

40) **(India) Arrowsmith, Aaron, Sketch of the Outline and Principal Rivers of India.** London: 1822. 82x63 cm. Folding map, dissected and backed with linen, nearly separated along the middle horizontal fold. Original plain slipcase, worn at dges and sides. Full color designating political control of the area. (Red for British, green for independent, yellow for "Territory under British Influence by Tribute, Protection or Subsidy") Thousands of towns and villages are

identified. A very useful map of the subcontinent at or near the height of the British period. \$750.00

41) **(Vermont) Whitelaw, James, Vermont from Actual Surveys.** Hartford, Vt.: 1824. 114x90 cm. Large wall map of Vermont, in very good condition. Light waterstain at right side, minor scattered chips with no loss of printed area. Outline color by county. This was one of only two issues of the Whitelaw map to include the attractive colored view of Montpelier by Mrs. S. I. Watrous. According to Ristow, p. 89, this was the last edition of one of the most important maps of Vermont, first published in 1796, but Wheat & Brun 200 refers to 1838 and 1851 editions, but does not mention this one. \$4,250.00

42) **(New England) Hale, Nathan, Map of the New England States, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Mass. ...** Boston: 1826. 111.6x99 cm. Wall map mounted on modern linen with rods. In very good condition, restored with varnish removed, but fairly dark. Outline color by county. An excellent, scarce map of New England, the first large map of the whole region since the Jeffreys map of the mid-18th century. Hale was the nephew of his Revolutionary War namesake. Wall map in very good condition, some age toning and mild chipping at top and right edges. There is a very early stitching repair at top left. Original rollers and linen backing. Bright outline color by state in some places, by county in others. Inset map of Florida. This is among the earliest maps to identify Austin's settlement in Texas which settlers had begun to populate in late 1825. Striking on this map is the large decorative title with a cartouche of an American eagle over it. Like most maps of the United States of this period, it shows only the eastern part of the continent, but does extend further than many other maps. It has an early appearance of Arkansas (sic), extended west to take in modern Oklahoma, though the map does not extend far enough west to show what is now the panhandle. Williams' relationship with Mitchell probably started with this guide and continued into the 1840's when he made other maps for Mitchell, including the Texas map for the 1846 Universal Atlas. The title above is from the cover to the guide. The map is entitled "Map of the United States, Constructed from the Latest Authorities." This is a scarce important blue-backed sea chart showing most of Florida (to the Suwanee River) and the Bahamas. Very good condition, standard wear, with a vertical crease near the center. This is one of the earliest American coastal charts devoted to the mapping of the entire Florida coast. Guthorn, p. 156, illustrates this issue of this map, which had significant changes from the 1844 first edition. Mapping the southern Florida coast was, until the early part of the 20th century, a most imprecise exercise given the widespread presence of wetlands which made precise, on the ground, measurements most difficult and which made the coastline quite variable from one year to the next. 83) (Mexico) *Disturnell, J., Mapa De Los Estados Unidos de Mejico ...* New York: 1848. 105x74 cm. Segmented and laid on linen, with original custom hand illustrated slip case and chemise. Very minor foxing on linen, but generally a fine example. Exceptional full color example of Disturnell's map of Texas, Upper California and Mexico, perhaps the single most important and influential map of the Texas and the Southwestern part of the United States in American History. Martin's 11th edition (Martin, Lawrence. Disturnell's map, by Colonel Lawrence Martin, chief of the Division of maps ... Library of Congress. Washington: U. S. Govt. Printing Office 1937. p. [339J-370.]). This is the first example of the map we have ever seen which has been dissected and laid on linen. The custom hand illustrated slip case, employing the national colors of the flag of Mexico and marvelous paste down label, strongly suggests that the original owner purchased the map in Mexico. Often referred to as the Disturnell

“Treaty Map,” the map is the most important map of the 19th century with respect to the boundary between the United States and Mexico. Engraved by John Disturnell in 1846 utilizing the same plate as White Gallaher & White’s 1828 map of Mexico, the map would go through a number of states in a two year period, with the 7th state of the map used in 1847 by the United States and Mexico in delineating the initial boundary for the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo and the 12th state of the map included with the written Treaty itself, thereby placing the Disturnell map as being of equal status to the maps of John Melish and John Mitchell in American Cartographic history. White Gallaher & White’s 1828 map was an adaptation of Tanner’s English language map of Mexico (published in 1826). The three maps are exceptionally important in American History, due to their historical context and function with regard to the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. Together the Tanner, White, Gallaher & White, and Disturnell maps document the cartographical sequence that resulted in the boundary dispute created by the errors in Disturnell’s map, following the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. The plates for the White Gallaher & White map were purchased by Disturnell and used for printing the Disturnell Maps of 1846-1858. It has often been said that White, Gallaher & White (and Disturnell) plagiarized Tanner’s map. While Tanner’s map was clearly a significant source, there is no proof that it was done with intent to defraud. At least one modern commentator has speculated that the similarity of the maps may have been the result of an agreement between the two firms. The White, Gallaher & White map was issued in 1828, the year in which the United States made a Treaty of Limits with Mexico. There was a market demand in



Latin America for a map with all the legends and place names in Spanish. The Tanner map was in English; White, The original White, Gallaher & White map was engraved by Balch & Stiles of New York. The firm name and original copyright notice were not completely removed by Disturnell and appears faintly on all Disturnell maps printed from these plates from 1846 through 1858. The Disturnell Map was not an official government publication—it just happened to be the map that Nicolas Trist took with him when he was sent as peace commissioner to Mexico in 1847. It was to be the map’s inaccuracies in locating El Paso and the Rio Grande, rather than its correctness, which made it historically significant in U.S.-Mexican relations. The map showed El Paso 34 miles north and 100 miles east of its true location. The lands in question were particularly important to the prospective railroad route to California and its newly discovered gold mines, a controversy which resulted in the US’s purchase in 1854 of the Gadsden Territory. The main map shows the eastern part of the continent, including the states in a line from Iowa to Louisiana and a small area west of them. A late edition of this very popular map which is most common in its early (1843 and 1844) editions. The rarer late (1847 to 1849) issues have inset maps of the State of Texas & Oregon Territory. The Texas inset shows the state extending northwest to the Arkansas River and including Santa Fe and Taos, making it one of the few post-statehood maps of Texas to extend the state that far. 

Very attractive, with 3 views of buildings: the Dobbs Ferry Depot, Stephen Archer's Villa, and James Bowen's Residence. In the map itself is an illustration of a locomotive pulling a one-car passenger train along the river. At the bottom is the view across the river of the cliffs overlooking the Hudson River in lower Rockland County. The site is now occupied by the Cabrini of Westchester Nursing Home. 


